

MSMTA COMPOSERS CIRCLE MSMTA/MTNA COMMISSIONED WORK

This year the MSMTA Composers Circle will be held in the Music Box of the Performing Arts Center at the Baltimore Campus of University of Maryland (UMBC) on Sunday, December 11, 2016 at 3:00 pm.

Each teacher is limited to entering two student compositions. (Sorry, no improvisations this year because of time constraints.) The concert offers students and teachers the opportunity to showcase their creative talents in their compositions and to hear a professional composition premiered. Please use the entry form in the Student Activities Handbook.

Teachers should encourage their students to finish and submit their compositions by the November 4 deadline. They will be printed in a Composers Circle Booklet which is given to each student and the participating teacher. All students will receive a certificate. A reminder: Students may not use CD's, recordings, etc. as part of their performance without permission of the chairs.

As part of the Composers Circle event, there will be a performance of an MSMTA/MTNA commissioned work by Dr. Linda Dusman, chair of the UMBC music department. Entitled "Dancing Universe," the work is written for piano trio and will be performed by Airi Yoshioka, violin, Gita Ladd, cello, and Li-Ly Chang, piano.

Bios of the composer and performing artists:

Dr. LINDA DUSMAN-COMPOSER

Dr. Linda Dusman is Professor of Music and Chair of University of Maryland, Baltimore County Department of Music. Her compositions and sonic art explore the richness of contemporary life from the personal to the political. She has received many awards for her creative work from Maryland State and national and international associations such as the American Composers Forum and the International Alliance for Women in Music. Dr. Dusman has also been a composer/artist in residence at Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, the New England Conservatory's Summer Institute for Contemporary Piano and a Visiting Professor at the Conservatorio di musica "G. Nicolini" in Piacenza, Italy. In addition to her creative work, Dr. Dusman has extensive experience as a journal-editor and is the founding editor of two journals: I Resound Press, a digital press/archive for music



by women composers, and the journal Women and Music: A Journal of Gender and Culture. Furthermore, she is a frequent contributor to the literature on contemporary music and performance; her articles have appeared in the journals Link, Perspectives of New Music, and Interface, as well as a number of anthologies.

AIRI YOSHIOKA-VIOLIN

Hailed by the Gramophone Magazine as "brilliant and intrepid", violinist Airi Yoshioka has concertized throughout the United States, Europe, Asia, and Canada as a recitalist, soloist and chamber musician. She is native of Japan but trained in the United States from the age of twelve. She holds a B.A. from Yale University and both an M.M. and DMA from The Juilliard School. She is currently Professor of Violin at the University of Maryland Baltimore County.



She is deeply committed to making chamber music and is the founding member of the Damocles Trio and Modigliani Quartet. She has also performed and recorded with the members of the Emerson, Brentano and Arditti Quartets. Her performing career is complemented by her work as an educational outreach artist for the New York Philharmonic and Lincoln Center Institute as well as teaching in New York City public schools. Her outreach work also involves performing in hospitals, hospices, and nursing homes.

GITA LADD-CELLO

"Superb cellist" and "...among Baltimore's most popular musicians", are but two of the accolades from the Baltimore Sun regarding the performances of Gita Ladd. During the last twenty years she has worked as a titled member of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and is currently Principal Cello with the Baltimore Opera Company, Concert Artists of Baltimore, and Post Classical Ensemble of Washington D.C. Ms. Ladd also has a long-standing commitment to the education of young musicians. In 2002 she was on the faculty of the Peabody Conservatory of Johns Hopkins University,



and in 2006 she joined the UMBC faculty. Ms. Ladd has an active 'cello studio, gives faculty recitals, performs with the contemporary music ensemble, "Ruckus", and has served as Director of UMBC Chamber Players.

LI-LY CHANG-PIANO

Li-ly Chang, composer and pianist, was born in Taiwan to a family deeply rooted in traditional Chinese music and arts. She began her piano studies very early and was performing in schools and concert venues by the age of eight. She received her Bachelor's Degree from National Taiwan University and her Master of Music in Piano & Composition from University of Texas. She also furthered her studies at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in piano, composition and chamber music. Ms. Chang studied with Sacha Gorodnitzki, Leon Fleisher, Sequeira Costa, Fernando Laires, Walter Hautzig and Jack Winerock. She has performed many solo recitals, chamber music concerts and been a soloist for concertos in the U.S, Europe and Asia to much acclaim. Her compositions have been performed at the Kennedy Center, U. S. State



Department, Strathmore Mansion and WQXR in New York. She is also very active as a teacher, gives master classes and lecture-recitals, and is in high demand as an adjudicator. Ms. Chang has taught at Tunghai University, Theological Baptist Seminary and Catonsville Community College and is now on the faculty of Montgomery College in Rockville, MD.

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IN MEMORIAM...

FERNANDO LAIRES

With great sadness we report the passing of Fernando Laires, teacher and friend of many Maryland State Music Teachers Association members, and past MSMTA Student Activities Chair. He died in Rochester, New York on September 9, 2016 at age 91. Mr. Laires leaves a rich musical legacy to his students and friends; his teacher tree places him only three musical generations away from Chopin and Liszt. He was a student of Isidor Philipp, who studied with Chopin's student Georges Mathias. Mr. Laires was also a student of Winfried Wolf, who studied with Liszt's student Emil von Sauer. In the spirit of Liszt's directive Géne oblige! (With genius comes obligation) Mr. Laires worked tirelessly to pass on the great traditions of these musical giants.

A native of Portugal, Mr. Laires graduated with highest honors in piano performance at the National Conservatory in Lisbon. He was winner of an award in London for his performance in cycle of the 32 Beethoven Sonatas at age 19, the youngest pianist who had ever accomplished this challenge.


Mr. Laires was a faculty member of the National Conservatory in Lisbon, the University of Texas at Austin, Peabody Conservatory, The Catholic University of America, Eastman School of Music, and he served as Chair of the Piano Faculty and as Artist in Residence at the Interlochen Arts Academy. He performed and presented master classes on five continents, including for twenty consecutive years as Permanent Guest Professor of Piano at the Shenyang Conservatory of Music in China. Mr. Laires was a jury member for many national and international piano competitions, including the Van Cliburn Competition, the Tchaikowsky Competition in Russia, and for many years, he served as Director of the University of Maryland International Competition and Festival (now called the William Kapell Competition and Festival).

Mr. Laires had a special interest in promoting Portugese music. In 1982, he was decorated by the Portugese government with the rank of Commander of the Order of Prince Henry the Navigator for his distinguished contributions to music.

As co-founder of the American Liszt Society, he helped to bring new understanding of this major composer's music. His wife, Nelita True, reminisced that he included Liszt on a recital program soon after he started teaching at the University of Texas. Some well-meaning colleagues took him aside after the recital and advised that he not program Liszt in the future since Liszt's music was not considered serious repertoire. This experience helped plant the seeds for his creation of the American Liszt Society.

It was appropriate that Mr. Laires was the subject of the first-ever interview in Keyboard Companion (now Clavier Companion The Piano Magazine). Attendees still recall his address to the 1992 National Conference on Piano Pedagogy; off-the-cuff, eloquent, and bold. He called on pedagogy teachers to examine traditions and trends in teaching and teacher training, and put forth the challenge to consider what must be retained and what should be redirected.

Mr. Laires was brilliant, elegant, and creative. He was steeped in the traditions of the Golden Age of Piano while also forward-thinking. He is greatly missed by his wife Nelita True;

A Memorial Concert in honor of Mr. Laires will be presented at Eastman School of Music on March 26, 2017 at 3 p.m. A Memorial Fund through the American Liszt Society is being prepared in his honor. Details will be announced in a future MSMTA newsletter.

JACK THAMES. MSMTA president 1973 to 1977,

We are sorry to learn that Jack Thames, **MSMTA president** from 1973 to 1977, has recently passed away.

A native of Columbia, South Carolina, Jack began piano studies at age 12, and won a music scholarship for Furman University from which he graduated with a BA in music. After serving in the U.S. Navy, he attended the Peabody Conservatory of Music and graduated from Peabody with a Masters of Music degree in 1958. He remained a Baltimore resident for the rest of his life, teaching in a variety of institutions including



Peabody. He served as president of the Baltimore Music Teachers Association, the Baltimore Music Club, the Alumni Association at Peabody, in addition to MSMTA. Later in his life he received the Masters of Liberal Arts degree from Johns Hopkins University. Jack is survived by close cousins in Summerville, SC.
