From The President

Greetings Colleagues,



I thank the nominating committee headed by Ann Matteson and Douglas Guiles and you the members for the opportunity to serve as President of MSMTA. I am humbled and honored. I owe immense gratitude to our esteemed Immediate Past President Junko Takahashi for her valuable knowledge and encouragement as I begin my tenure. I am also grateful to our board members for their support and willingness to continue to serve. We have a highly qualified, professional board that works together for a better musical today and tomorrow. We also have a myriad of festivals, competitions, and examinations thanks to dedicated, vibrant

Activities Chairs. We welcome to the board Wendy Johnston, our new VP of Publications and Yuri Chayama, our new historian.

I was excited to attend my first MTNA Leadership Summit in Cincinnati, Ohio where we were privy to a tour of MTNA headquarters. The general and break-out sessions at the September 8-10 Summit were both informative and inspiring. MTNA Executive Director and CEO Gary Ingle presented a workshop, "Association 101 and Robert's Rule of Order". I found it an interesting coincidence that Henry M. Robert published his manual on Parliamentary Law in 1876, the same year that MTNA was founded.

Membership retention and growth are always a concern as was discussed in our States-By-Size breakout session. One representative reported growth in collegiate chapters because of active MTNA Collegiate faculty willing to serve as sponsors of collegiate chapters. Victoria Fischer Faw presented her journey in establishing a virtual chapter in North Carolina since many parts of the state are rural, remote, and not accessible to the local associations in the larger cities. States in our group of 350-499 members were Arizona, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. Since on June 30, 2023 our membership was four hundred seventy-nine (479), I think we can grow to 500 and enter the next category of states with members 500-749 for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

The highlight of the Sunday session was a presentation entitled "Creating Melodies of Belonging with Notes of Inclusion" by Ivy Banks, Vice President of Diversity at Xavier University in Cincinnati. She encouraged leaders to not only think of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, but to extend this endeavor to the act of actually creating a sense of Belonging as we use our position as leaders and teachers to open the door and equitably include people of diverse abilities, size, gender, ethnic and racial backgrounds, and sexual identity. The two evening recitals that featured solo and duet performances by attendees reflected great diversity in programming. This was the brainchild of charismatic MTNA President Peter Mack who proposed this highly successful format.

Speaking of diversity, thanks to the meticulous work of the DEI Committee we now have an evolving database of music by unheard voices to expand our teaching, recital, and competition repertoire. I hope you have had a chance to peruse the data in Music of Underrepresented Composers and Nancy Breth's list of Piano Music of Modern Composers born after 1905. I sent the links to these two lists that provide not only names and representative music, elementary through advanced competition-level pieces for piano, violin, viola, voice, and chamber music, but also links to YouTube performances of these pieces by Indigenous composers and Composers of African, Asian, and LatinX descent, as well as 20th and 21st century composers. In order to promote the inclusion of underrepresented composers in competition literature, there will be a monetary prize for the best performance of a piece by a Woman composer or composer of African or Asian descent in all divisions of the E. R. Davis Competition on April 21 and April 28, 2024. In future years a different group of diverse composers will be featured. We are replacing the composer classification list with the more inclusive May 2022 AMT Composers Classification List on the website.

We are also in the midst of bringing up to date the history of MSMTA on the website. This will include a listing of honorary members who have been instrumental to the growth, stature, and increase of MSMTA.

I have learned of a \$5,000 scholarship for high school seniors declaring music as a major and for undergraduate music majors attending school in Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey. You may google Audrey Sherrill and Michael D'Ambrisi Music Scholarship for more information.

I look forward to seeing you at the virtual conference on Sunday, October 15!

"If you Like That, You'll Love This!" **Piano Repertoire Alternatives for Overplayed Pieces**

Dr. Kate Boyd, DMA, NCTM

Classical piano literature is vast, rich and varied. Yet it seems that the same handful of pieces are performed most frequently. This is understandable: students often hear other students play a piece and decide they'd also like to play it, and teachers become accustomed to teaching certain pieces in order to reliably develop specific components of musicianship and technique in their students. This session will propose alternatives to some of the most commonly-played pieces, in order to broaden repertoire options for teachers and students alike.

"Memorization Techniques for a More Secure Performance" Dr. Theresa Bogard -Professor of Piano

Memorization is the bane of our existence as pianists. This lecture will present ways to feel more secure when playing in public by focusing on the four types of memory—Visual, Auditory, Intellectual and Kinesthetic. Concrete examples of ways to practice in order to solidify memory will be presented in addition to a discussion of why we play from memory and if we even should!

Presenters



Kate Boyd has performed solo recitals at New York's Carnegie Hall, Schubert's birth house in Vienna, the National Concert Hall in Dublin, the Musikhalle Hamburg, in addition to many other venues. Concerts and conferences have taken her to Germany, New Zealand, England, Canada, Malaysia, Greece, Florida, Texas, California, Idaho, Minnesota, Ohio, Illinois, Wisconsin, New York, and Michigan, among other places.

She has recorded two solo CDs. John Cage's *Sonatas* and *Interludes* for prepared piano was met with critical acclaim and has received more than 100,000 digital streams and downloads and streams to date. Her other

CD, *Music for the End of Winter*, consists of previously unrecorded works for solo piano by five American composers.

A versatile musician who is at home performing music from the 17th century to the present, Boyd regularly collaborates with other musicians and artists. She was a founding member of the Oracle Trio, a New York-based piano trio that performed throughout the US for ten years. Dr. Boyd is also a well-regarded educator; she received the 2019 Teacher of the Year award from the Indiana Music Teachers Association and the 2017 Outstanding Professor of the Year award from Butler University. She was also a featured presenter at the 2018 MTNA Collegiate Symposium. In October 2021 she created an educational YouTube channel (called "ThePianoProf"), which has more than 2300 subscribers to date.

Boyd is also active as a conference clinician. She has presented lectures and workshops at state, regional, national and international conferences, including the 2023 MTNA National Conference in Reno; the International John Cage Conference in Malaysia; the European Piano Teachers Association Conference in Germany; the College Music Society Great Lakes Regional Conference; and various state conferences. She is in high demand as an adjudicator; events she has judged include the MTNA Southern Division Competitions, the ISSMA state competition, and Stickley Piano Competition. For three years, Boyd also served on the national Fulbright screening committee for piano applicants. She regularly gives masterclasses to students through teacher organizations and universities, and she has worked with students of all ages.

Kate Boyd serves as Professor of Piano at Butler University. In the summers, she taught for 11 years at the internationally renowned Interlochen Arts Camp in northern Michigan. She holds degrees from Stony Brook University, Oberlin Conservatory, and the Hannover (Germany) Academy of Music. Her major teachers were Gilbert Kalish, Arbo Valdma, and Arie Vardi.



Theresa Bogard, is a dynamic, versatile performer dedicated to expanding the canon of traditional piano repertoire. Her early career focused on performances of music by women composers, and she continues to include works by other lesser known composers in her varied programs.

As a recipient of a coveted Fulbright grant, Bogard was able to explore her interest in historical performance practice and fortepiano studying at the Royal Conservatory of the Hague in the Netherlands. That same year she was a top-prize winner in the International Mozart Fortepiano Competition in Bruges, Belgium. A world traveler with a passion for other cultures, Bogard has

performed on five continents in Belgium, Austria, Germany, The Netherlands, Italy, Mexico, Bolivia, Brazil, New Zealand, Australia, Korea, Indonesia, Thailand, China, Taiwan, Singapore, and throughout the United States. Her extensive discography includes a wide variety of recordings ranging from solo piano to chamber music collaborations, from music of living composers to her specialty in fortepiano and historical performance practice.

She has served on the faculty of the InterHarmony International Music Festival in Italy and the Sulzbach-Rosenberg International Music Festival in Germany and has performed at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall and at the Ravinia Steans Institute with cellist Misha Quint. Since her first concert tour in Brazil in 2007, she has become obsessed with the music of Brazilian composers. Returning to Brazil whenever possible, she has given masterclasses and performances at universities in São Paulo, Rio de Janeiro, Cuiaba, Curitiba, Florianopolis, Goiania and Porto Alegre. In 2018, she toured five cities in Brazil with the Trio das Nações and will return to Brazil in 2022 for a recording of works for flute and piano by Brazilian composers.

Internationally known as a pedagogue, she has been honored with numerous teaching awards. She attracts students from around the world as professor of piano at the University of Wyoming, where she also served as chair of the music department from 2010 to 2016. In 2008, she was chosen as the Wyoming Professor of the Year by the Carnegie Foundation. Her students have distinguished themselves in numerous piano competitions and been accepted into the top graduate and undergraduate programs in the country including: The Julliard School, Eastman School of Music, Cleveland Institute of Music, Oberlin College Conservatory of Music, Manhattan School of Music and Peabody Conservatory of Music among others. She has also served as an adjudicator at numerous regional, national and international piano competitions. Dr. Bogard is a Steinway Artist.



Jay DeWire, piano, has performed across the United States as a soloist, collaborator, and member of the West Shore Trio, including concerts in Chautauqua, Los Angeles, New Mexico, Michigan, Troy University, the North American Saxophone Alliance, St. Mary's College, the South Carolina School for the Arts, the Smithsonian American Art Museum, Goucher College, the Duke Ellington School for the Arts, An die Musik LIVE! in Baltimore, and twice as soloist with the Prince George's Philharmonic. He teaches piano and history at Frostburg State University.

Dr. DeWire began playing piano at the age of four and gave his first solo recital at age 12. He received a B.A. with High Distinction and a Master of Arts in piano performance from the University of Virginia, and a Master of Music from the New England Conservatory, and a

D.M.A. from the University of Maryland School of Music (College Park). He has studied with such distinguished pianists as Joanne Haroutounian, Mimi Tung, Gabriel Chodos, Bradford Gowen, Steve Drury, John Moriarty, Larissa Dedova, and Brian Ganz, and has performed in master classes for Claude Frank, Andre Watts, Ruth Laredo, and Tigran Alikhanov.

Carroll County Music Teachers Association



CCMTA began 2023 on Monday, February 6, 2023 with a delightful and fascinating presentation of the "History of Dance" given by Emily Runkle and Melissa Lineburg of Ballet Embody, Carroll County's first professional ballet company, at Synergy Space in Westminster, MD. The history of various dance forms-from Waltz, Mazurka, and Polonaise to Minuet, Gavotte, Gigue, and Bouree—was presented with a history lesson and demonstration of each dance. It was interesting to learn that the invention of elastic allowed the leaps and higher arm positions of the 20th century ballet form. The information we learned has so much potential to help us interpret the dance forms we encounter in our piano music. Our usual CCMTA business meeting followed.

On Saturday, February 25, 2023 we had another successful **Solo & Ensemble Festival Recital** held at St. Paul's United Church of Christ in Westminster, MD. Three member teachers participated with 23 of their students performing in two recitals. Cindy Hoover has been chairperson of this event for many years.

On Saturday, March 25, 2023 the annual CCMTA **Masterclass** took place again at St. Paul's UCC with five students participating, performing pieces from Beethoven, Chopin, Copland, Liszt, and Mendelssohn. The master clinician was Dr. Ernest Ragogini, who interacted so well with each student and gave great support to all teachers attending.

On Saturday, April 22, 2023 the annual CCMTA **Spring Recital** was held at St.

Paul's UCC in Westminster, MD. This year's theme was "All American" and by that we meant music from North, Central, and South America, featuring piano pieces from Canada all the way to Argentina.
